Interventions

Affordable Warmth Scheme

Measures available: Loft and/or Cavity Wall Insulation, Upgraded Central Heating System, Windows, Solid Wall Insulation (circa £7,500 grant-aid. Properties with solid wall construction may get grant-aid up to £10,000).

The scheme may be available to you if you:

• Live in Northern Ireland; own and occupy your property as your main home or rent from a private landlord; have a total annual gross income of less than £23,000.

To qualify, you must:

Be over 65/Have a child in receipt of Child Benefit/Receive Disability Living Allowance (DLA), Personal Independence Payment (PIP) or Attendance Allowance.



Interventions

Northern Ireland Sustainable Energy Programme (NISEP)

Measures available: Natural gas central heating system if on the gas network or Oil central heating system where gas is not available, Loft and/or Cavity Wall Insulation.

The scheme may be available to you if you:

• Live in Northern Ireland, and own and occupy your property as your main home or Rent from a private landlord.

To qualify, you must be:

• a Single Person or a Single Parent Family/Couple with a with an income/pension less £50,000 (Income varies for fully funded and part funded schemes).



Interventions

Belfast Warm and Well Project

Northern Exposure Programme, NEA NI, Public Health Agency (PHA), Belfast City Council.

Aim:

 Energy advice; Practical support to stay warm and well; The provision of heating measures and discretionary financial assistance; Support directly individuals and organisations.

The Project is targeted at People with/who/have:

• Cardiovascular, respiratory conditions (in particular, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and childhood asthma), mental health conditions and disabilities.

Sustainable Energy Communities

Supported by the Big Lottery Fund and working across four communities across NI.



NEA NI Policy Priorities

NI Assembly & Executive

There are 4 key areas in NI we have long been calling for:

- Introduction of a **statutory fuel poverty target** (NI is the only region of the UK without one).
- The development and implementation of a **new Fuel Poverty Strategy** for NI (the last one is from 2011 and is no longer fit for purpose). NI Fuel Poverty Coalition recommendations for the new strategy can be found <u>here</u>.
- Introduction of minimum energy efficiency standards, especially within the private rented sector.
- **Financial support** for low income and vulnerable households in NI. This includes both short-term measures to boost incomes and a longer-term commitment to invest in energy efficiency measures in homes in NI as part of the Just Transition to Net Zero.



NEA NI Policy Priorities

Westminster

Our **GE24 Manifesto** Asks:

- Introduce the Warm Home Discount (WHD) scheme in Northern Ireland.
- Make domestic energy efficiency an infrastructure priority.
- Ensure a 'Just Transition' towards Net Zero.



Current Fuel Poverty Crisis

LucidTalk polling for NEA NI, September 2024

Fuel poverty rate: 40%

• 40% of households spending at least 10% of their total household expenditure on energy costs and were therefore living in fuel poverty.



NI Representative Survey (September 2024) 1,199 responses

Detrimental 'coping' mechanisms:

- Such as self-disconnection or rationing of heat.
- 27% of people in NI said that in the last 24 months they have gone without heating or electricity on at least one occasion due to not being able to afford the costs of energy. This is up from 19% in 2023.
- 1 in 10 households admitted to skipping meals to ensure they had enough money to pay for their energy.

Health and wellbeing impacts:

- 31% of households reported health and wellbeing impacts due to rising energy prices and the cost of living.

 E.g. Mental health impacts (21%); Deterioration of an existing health condition (14%); Requiring more visits to a GP or hospital (5%).
- 57% of people are worried about paying for their energy at present or in the coming winter.
